

Module 3: The Word of God in Scripture, Life and Community

Aim: To link reality as we perceive it, the community in which we live and our faith story, both in the Bible and in our own lives.

Content: Understanding beliefs and values; Linking scripture to life experience; Images of God; Introducing Old Testament/New Testament Theme of liberation, Exodus, Prophecy of Kingdom: Church/Kingdom.



Module 4: Ignatian Prayer/Discernment/Action

Aim: To enable participants to explore pastoral methods for building the Kingdom of God today.

Content: Looking at Ignatian Spirituality; Power and Powerlessness, Exercising power; Experiences of prayer; Freedom to act; Working together for the Kingdom of God.

How long is the course?

The course takes place over about five months and comprises four non-residential weekend modules. In addition, participants are also expected to attend three short base-group meetings between Modules 1 and 2, Modules 2 and 3, and Modules 3 and 4 - a total of nine meetings in all. Further details of the Modules are given below.

Who will deliver the course?

Shrewsbury Diocese now has a team of people accredited by the Craighead Institute to run the course. Mary Kilcoyne, an Associate Member of the Craighead Institute, will be the course director and she will be assisted by Joan Sharples and Trish Chrisp.

Where will the course take place?

When will it run?

8 full days between September 2010 and June 2011.

What does it cost?

The cost will be £300.00 per person

Who might benefit from this Course?

Anyone wanting to reflect on their faith/daily- living balance and integration and to respond accordingly. Parish Clergy, pastoral team leaders and members, justice and peace group members, catechists, adult educators, parish ministers, parishioners, spiritual directors, school teachers, departmental heads, school chaplains, pastoral workers and those in the caring profession would all benefit from this experience.



This course provides an opportunity to meet in a safe environment with other committed people engaged in a journey to a deeper, more meaningful and relevant faith which expresses itself as part of the Church's mission to the world.

Participants will be encouraged to discover more energising and empowering ways of working through an experiential approach aimed at integrating life and faith. There are no 'essays'. Participants will be asked to reflect on their own learning. (two sides of A4 reflection/personal learning is all that is required).



The Four Modules in Detail

Module 1: Trust Building and Communication Skills

Aim: To develop interpersonal skills in listening, interaction in groups and facilitation.

Content: The Path of discernment; The principle and foundation of God's love; Trust Building; Listening and Communication Skills; Understanding group dynamics; Facilitating a group; Keeping to task; Learning how to keep a log book; Pastoral Cycle, reflecting on my own journey.

Module 2: Christianity and Social Concern

Aim: To assist one another in linking faith and justice through an understanding and knowledge of society and the social teachings of the Church.

Content: Understanding my own Faith journey; Looking at the wider world; Justice/injustice; Understanding: Perspective /Bias/ Stance i.e. how I see things; How to do Social Analysis; Ecumenical Social Teachings.
